What is Hope for Cats?

Hope for Cats is a 501(c)(3) non-profit, wholly volunteer organization. We have NO paid employees and all donations go directly to the care of our residents and foster cats. Hope for Cats operates Jake's Place - a cage free, no-kill shelter and adoption center. There is no limit to the length of time a cat can stay at Jake's Place. Admissions are limited only to control overcrowding. Hope for Cats receives no federal or state funding and is wholly dependent upon fundraising activities, foundation grants, and private donations to support its work. All of our cats are special, and we strive to provide excellent veterinary care and a home-like environment for each of them.

<u>Birch and Crocus</u>: These are 9-year-old siblings whose owner has an illness which prevents him from continuing to



care for them. Their veterinarian contacted one of our volunteers, and now we have these two healthy, friendly cats. Their owner, who lives on the far east side of Buffalo, took great

care of them, although he had to take the bus for their vet visits. Birch (solid grey male) does take ¼ of a small pill each day for a heart murmur, and he is a very good pill taker. His sister, Crocus, and he would welcome a new home where they can stay together.



Kensington Expressway Kittens: You may have seen this story in the Buffalo News or on area TV stations. Near midnight in early July, two men heard a "thump" when they were near a Kensington Expressway overpass near downtown Buffalo. They investigated and found a plastic tote which had been tossed to the pavement and still contained two small kittens. They phoned the Buffalo police and one of the BPD officers phoned one of our volunteers, who had just gotten home from work. Our volunteer dropped everything late that night and collected

the kittens. A couple of days later, a third kitten appeared and was also taken in by our volunteer.



Fortunately, none of the kittens

were injured in this fall and all three, named Salem, Storm and Vlad, are enjoying their new home with our volunteer's family.

<u>Volunteer Opportunities</u>: We can always use volunteers to help at our small shelter. We ask only that you commit to volunteering once per week between 9:00 am and 9:00 pm on the day you choose. You can sign up to feed, clean, scoop litter, or do health checks and give medications to any cats who are on meds. Even one hour per week will be a great help. If you have fundraising ideas, we can always use funds to help with our veterinary expenses. As an all-volunteer organization, our administrative costs are very low, allowing 98% to 99% of our revenue each year to be expended in direct support of our cats. - Lilies
- Household cleaners
- Flea and tick spot-on products for dogs
- Antidepressants
- NSAIDs (such as ibuprofen and naproxen)
- Prescription ADD/ADHD medications
- Over-the-counter cough, cold and allergy medications
- Plants containing insoluble calcium oxalate crystals (such as peace lily, philodendron and pothos)
- Household insecticides
- Glow sticks and glow jewelry
