What is Hope for Cats?

Hope for Cats is a 501(c)(3) non-profit, wholly volunteer organization. We have NO paid employees and all donations go directly to the care of our residents and foster cats. Hope for Cats operates Jake's Place - a cage free, no-kill shelter and adoption center. There is no limit to the length of time a cat can stay at Jake's Place. Admissions are limited only to control overcrowding. Hope for Cats receives no federal or state funding and is wholly dependent upon fundraising activities, foundation grants, and private donations to support its work. All of our cats are special, and we strive to provide excellent veterinary care and a home-like environment for each of them.

<u>Sonny</u>: In late June an Albion resident found an injured stray cat who had a wound on his face and appeared to be blind and deaf. She contacted Hope for Cats and



contacted Hope for Cats and surrendered Sonny to us. After a visit to a veterinarian, he received medication for his wound, surgery for one eye condition, and he was neutered and vaccinated. We made an appointment with a veterinary eye specialist who confirmed that he had no vision in either eye,

and recommended removal of his right eye, which was visibly damaged, in order to avoid possible later development of a malignant sarcoma which can develop in cats with lens damage. During this surgery 8 birdshot pellets were recovered from Sonny's right eye, and a skull x-ray found 28 more pellets lodged throughout his face and head. So, we received the shocking news that Sonny's facial wound, his blindness, and probably his deafness, were caused by an intentional act of cruelty toward this perfectly friendly young cat. Based on the pellets visible in the skull x-ray, the veterinarian advised removal of his left eve also, again to prevent future malignancy. This surgery was performed, during which the veterinarian did confirm that 2 more of the pellets were lodged in his left eye. Sonny recovered from this surgery and he is amazing, in that he remains friendly, curious, affectionate, loves catnip toys and has no problem finding his litterbox, food and water. It is incomprehensible that someone could look this handsome guy in the face and shoot him. However, Sonny

now has a permanent home where he is safe and loved and getting along fine with his 2



new feline housemates, and getting lots of attention from his new guardian, a long-time Hope for Cats supporter. We ask only that you commit to volunteering once per week between 9:00 am and 9:00 pm on the day you choose. 

Dave: Dave began showing up at the house of an HFC volunteer in the Spring, where he would chase the birds and

squirrels. He was scrawny and had patchy fur and was obviously a stray. The volunteer began putting food out for him and the plan was formed to live trap him. That was successfully done. He was initially isolated in the barn of a second HFC volunteer before he was taken to be neutered,



vaccinated, dewormed and given a topical to kill fleas and lice (which was likely the cause of his patchy fur). It was estimated that Dave is 1-2 years old. It was then decided to try to socialize Dave. So far, that is going well. While still a little skittish around people, he can be petted and particularly likes chin scritches. He gets along well with the other cats at his new home. His only bad trait is that he likes to chirp, singing the song of his people, typically anywhere from midnight to 3 a.m. But then Dave is a cat.
