What is Hope for Cats?

Hope for Cats is a 501(c)(3) non-profit, wholly volunteer organization. We have NO paid employees, and all donations go directly to the care of our residents and foster cats. Hope for Cats operates Jake's Place - a cage free, no-kill shelter and adoption center. There is no limit to the length of time a cat can stay at Jake's Place. Admissions are limited only to control overcrowding. Hope for Cats receives no federal or state funding and is wholly dependent upon fundraising activities, foundation grants, and private donations to support its work. All of our cats are special, and we strive to provide excellent veterinary care and a home-like environment for each of them.

Speedy: Speedy is a 13-year-old cat whose owner died. A relative chose to take perfectly healthy Speedy to be euthanized. Fortunately, the staff at Adoring Pets Veterinary clinic refused this request and contacted us. Speedy was adopted by one of our Board members and now enjoys birdwatching and other pursuits.

<u>Volunteer Opportunities</u>: We can always use volunteers to help at our small shelter. We ask only that you commit to volunteering once per week between 9:00 am and 9:00 pm on the day you choose. You can sign up to feed, clean, scoop litter, or do health checks and give medications to any cats who are on meds. Even one hour per week will be a great help. The two boys bonded immediately and were adopted together. The photos show them together at Tabby Town prior to adoption, and then in their new home.



The Wheatfield Family: Six very young kittens were found under a fireplace overhang 3 days before the house sale was to close, so it was urgent to relocate them. Their mom had to be trapped as well. Mom and the kittens went to a foster home until they could receive veterinary care, including spaying or neutering. All 6 kittens were socialized and adopted. Mom (Shawnee) decided that she would prefer to retain her mostly feral personality, so, thanks to Feral Cat Focus, she found a great barn home. 
